**Pharmacologic (Adenosine or Dobutamine) Myocardial Perfusion Study**

We ask that you read through this document to ensure that you will have the most successful visit possible. Please arrive about 15 minutes prior to your scheduled appointment time to fill out any necessary paperwork. We thank you for your assistance!

**Please allow yourself about 3-4 hrs for the nuclear stress testing.**

**Parking:**

UTP-Fannin: Please park next door in the UTP Parking Garage at 6414 Fannin. We will provide you with a voucher after your test so your parking will be free. When you arrive on the 6<sup>th</sup> floor, do not check in at the main desk. Please proceed to the right side of the unit once you see the main desk and around the corner to the Non-Invasive Area check-in window.

UTP-Bellaire: Please park in any of the free parking located west of the 610 Freeway and just behind the building as it faces 610. We are located on the 5<sup>th</sup> floor, Suite 540.

The most important points of this document are summarized:

- 1, No Caffeine:** Absolutely no coffee, sodas, tea, or chocolate, or smoking for 12 hrs before the test.
- 2. Nothing to Eat or Drink** after midnight the night before your exam, except for sips of water to take with medications.
- 3. Wear comfortable clothing** with no metal buttons or zippers on your shirt.

This test is a two-part imaging procedure which uses a radioactive material (technetium or thallium), administration of a medication called adenosine or dobutamine, and a camera connected to a computer to produce two sets of pictures of the blood flow to the heart muscle. The scan will tell us if there are areas of the heart muscle that do not receive enough blood either at rest or during stress.

**ALL CANCELLATIONS must be made 24 hrs in advance.**

### **Before your Pharmacologic Stress Nuclear Test:**

- Please discuss any questions or concerns you have with your physician.
- It is important that you do not eat or drink anything after midnight the night before the exam.
- However, please take any scheduled medications with sips of water, as instructed by your physician.
- It is important that you do not eat or drink any caffeinated or decaffeinated products for 12 hours before the exam. Examples of **Unacceptable Products** include: **coffee, chocolate items, tea, all decaffeinated items, or medications containing caffeine – such as Excedrin, diet pills etc.** Example of acceptable drinks include: water, juice, and white milk.
- If you are diabetic, please talk with your doctor about any insulin dose changes that may be needed due to food restriction on the day of the exam.
- Allow extra time for checking in.
- Wear clothing and shoes that are comfortable. It would be advisable to wear a two piece outfit for the test. You will be asked to remove clothing and jewelry from the waist up. You may be given a short hospital gown.
- You will be asked about your medical history including medications that you are taking. Please mention if you are on a beta-blocker. Mention any herbs or supplements that you are taking.
- Your exam will be explained to you and any questions or concerns will be addressed. You will then be asked to sign a consent form.
- A small intravenous catheter (IV) will be placed in your arm vein for the injections.
- You may want to bring something to read or work on to help pass the time.

### **During the Resting Nuclear Scan Study:**

- To start your exam, you will receive an injection of the radioactive material into a vein in your arm to obtain a resting study of your heart.
- Pictures of your heart are taken 45-90 minutes after that injection.
- You will lie on a table and pictures of your heart will be taken with a large camera and computer. Pictures will usually take 15 minutes to complete.



### **During your Pharmacologic Stress Test:**

- You will be given an infusion of a drug to simulate the effects of exercise (either a 4-minute infusion of an agent called adenosine, or increasing doses of a drug called dobutamine to raise your heart rate). Some patients may experience a flushing sensation through the face/throat, a pressure on their chest, shortness of breath, head fullness, or nausea. These are common symptoms that will be monitored by the testing team. Some patients do not feel anything at all while some may feel moderate to intense symptoms.
- During this infusion, the radioactive material will be injected into your IV.



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**During the Stress Nuclear Scan Study:**

- About 45-90 minutes after the second radioactive material is injected, you will again lie on a table and pictures of your heart will be taken with a large camera and computer. Pictures will usually take 15 minutes to complete.

**After Your Pharmacologic Stress Nuclear Test:**

- Return to normal activity unless your healthcare provider tells you otherwise.
- Be sure to keep your follow-up appointments.

**Your Test Results:**

- The results of your pharmacologic stress nuclear test will be sent to your physician. Your physician will discuss your test results with you during a future office visit. The test results help your physician plan your treatment and any other tests that are needed.

**CONSIDERATIONS**

Please notify the Nuclear Cardiology staff and your doctor if you are pregnant or breastfeeding. Pregnant women should not undergo this test.

It is very important that you hold very still for **15 minutes** with your arms above your head during the exam. If you feel this may be a problem, please tell the Nuclear Cardiology staff.

If you are claustrophobic, please **inform** the Nuclear Cardiology staff as soon as possible before your exam.

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
